Bupivacaine is the only long-acting local anesthetic agent formulated in a dental cartridge. When compared to short-acting local anesthetics, bupivacaine ' s prolonged soft tissue and periosteal anesthesia has been shown to limit post-operative pain.

Tetracaine, a para-aminobenzoic acid ester, is an effective local anaesthetic for topical application; a 4% gel is indicated for anaesthesia before venepuncture or venous cannulation. It is rapidly absorbed from mucous membranes and should never be applied to inflamed, traumatised, or highly vascular surfaces.

Bilateral mandibular block anaesthesia, with additional local infiltration anaesthesia, is recommended for surgical treatment of the lower front, such as extensive pre-implantological treatments (e.g. a chin bone transplant) and implantological treatments (two or four dental implants).

A local anaesthetic, usually given by injection, may be used along with a sedative medication to keep you relaxed while an operation or procedure is carried out. Local anaesthetics are mainly used for relatively minor procedures, such as: a filling or wisdom tooth removal; a minor skin operation, such as the removal of moles, warts and verrucas

Local anaesthesia - NHS

In dentistry, the most commonly used local anesthetic is lidocaine (also called xylocaine or liignocaine) and procaine (also known as novocaine). Lidocaine's half-life in the body is about 1.5–2 hours. As of 2018, novocaine is most commonly used in dental procedures to numb the area around a tooth.

The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry (AAPD) defines local anesthesia as "the temporary loss of sensation including pain in one part of the body produced by a topically-applied or injected agent without depressing the level of consciousness."
