What Is Theological Reflection?

Theological reflection is a spiritual discipline in self-care and in personal and professional growth. Yet as a theological exercise its focus stretches well beyond the personal. In a theological context our subjective experiences and concerns are reflected upon in relation to faith and wisdom traditions that reach for ultimate reality.
